Randee Wilson are co-owners of Nature By Design, a garden center and landscaping company specializing in native plants of the Chesapeake Bay watershed.

A former software engineer, Carla

began designing residential landscapes in 1999. She has lectured on sustainable landscaping, habitat design, and wildlife ecology at Patuxent River Wildlife Refuge, George Washington University, the National Arboretum's Lahr Native Plant Symposium, area garden clubs, and the National Capital Area Garden Clubs, where she is an instructor for the Landscape Design School.

Great Sunflower Bee Project

On average, home gardeners saw a bee pollinate every 2.6 minutes, but 20% never saw a bee at all. In response to reported bee declines, data about US bee populations is being gathered by participants in the Great Sunflower Bee Project, based at San Francisco State University. Free Lemon Queen sunflower seeds will be mailed in March for 2010 counts, or plant your own Lemon Queens and report your observations (15 minutes twice each month) to the Project. 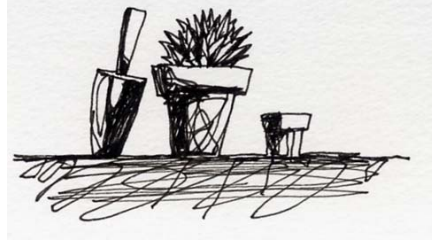
